## Impact Report 2022 – 2023

Major Impacts and Outcomes 2022 – 2023

Improve the pupil's literacy levels	Pupil reading ages were circulated to Form Tutors who monitored reading in form time and oversaw accelerated reader quizzes on the books the pupils have read. The data was circulated to staff to inform their teaching of pupils and to enable them to differentiate their curriculum to make it accessible to all pupils of all reading ages.				
	Accelerated reader data is used as an indicator of those pupils who require literacy intervention. The data is also used to identify pupils who might benefit from attending 'Paired Reading' sessions.				
	Both the secondary and primary library has continued to be remodelled, new and more relevant book stock has been purchased in both Libraries. Library lessons for Primary and Year 7 and 8 have continued. Initiatives have included organising Author Visits, Reading Ambassadors Year 7 and 8 Readers work with Primary paired reading. Liaising regularly with the Primary Department to support pupil engagement with the Curriculum. Reading lists, Library Newsletter and administering Accelerated Reader, Book Buzz and the Letterbox club. The librarian also runs clubs at lunchtime to improve pupils' engagement in reading. The librarian has been integral to building a whole school reading culture across both Primary and Secondary.				
	In academic year 2022 – 2023 70% of pupils increased their reading ages by at least 3 months. 59% of pupils made in excess of 12 months progress over the course of the academic year.				
	1 Teaching Assistant and 1 Librarian have been trained in Lexonik vocabulary. 28 Teachers were trained in September 2022. 25 pupils have been recipients of the Lexonik course. The average reading age increase has been: 28 Months (2 Years 4 Months).

pupils rates of progress in English and Mathematics	A variety of enrichment activities were enjoyed by Year 10 and 11 pupils and the impact of these is reflected in the GCSE results.				
Wathematics	An experienced Teaching Assistant for Maths worked with small groups and individuals to improve identified areas to give them the opportunity to make at least their expected target. This work was often when the pupil was absent from a previous lesson and the Teaching Assistant took them out of the lesson for a short period of time to ensure they had grasped the key concepts of the lesson missed so they were able to continue with learning.				
Improve the outcomes for identified	Supported a group of 12 pupils to create 2 short films offering support to other young people with additional needs on the topic of hidden disabilities and employability. They led a whole school assembly to share the students work and empower other young

people to take an interest in important topics relevant to them. The videos can be found Guides – Young People's Hub from KIDS

Staff have undertaken professional development in Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT) theory and practice, which complements our current 1:1 intervention, offering a more therapeutic style of working. Many of our students are on a considerable waiting list for CBT therapy through the Child and Adolescent Mental Health Service (CAMHS). We can now offer a joined-up approach to supporting the whole child from education and health.

Developed the Citizenship/wellbeing carousel of lessons and Zones of Regulation curriculum to support the social, emotional and mental health (SEMH) needs of pupils and improve our universal offer to commence in September 2023;

- 1:1 pupil support themes this term, have been challenging negative thinking patterns and how to change our mindset. Areas of focus are school related anxiety, gender transitioning and low mood.
- 1:1 support for pupils in both Pod and main school around the themes of developing resilience, improving mental health, behaviour and self esteem, emotional regulation, anxiety in school, self harm behaviours and school attendance.
